If the UK is to remain a world-leading knowledge economy, it needs people with skills in science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM). Delivering the scientists and technicians of the future means starting young, in primary and secondary schools, and inspiring young people to want to take science further.

The Salters' Company, one of the ancient London livery companies, founded the Salters' Institute in 1918 to support the UK chemical industry by helping returning servicemen to study chemistry.

Today, the Salters' Institute continues the mission by working with schools to help them inspire their young people to continue with science. The Institute does this through a range of exciting and engaging programmes including curriculum development, hands on chemistry events and awards for excellence across many fields of science education.

2018 is the Institute's Centenary year, and we are focusing on the critical ages of 11 - 14, when young people form ideas about the kind of career they want. You can inspire more young people to be scientists and technicians by

- Helping us expand the Salters' Festivals of Chemistry for 11-14 year olds, taking them to universities for a day to get a taste of chemistry and discover how inspiring chemistry can be. In 2018, 3,000 young people participated in 53 Festivals at 46 universities and colleges
- Helping us expand our local Salters' Technicians Networks for school science technicians to support practical science in schools
- Helping us update our Salters' Chemistry Club resources for teachers
- Helping us to expand Salters' Outreach with London Primary Schools
- Helping our partners, the University of York, develop a new and challenging programme to teach science to 11- 14 year olds. In the past 10 years, over a million students have followed Salters' science courses
